September — in the rain

SEPTEMBER was one of the wettest months on record, according to Mr. Edwin Hamson, of 5, Maygoods View, Cowley.

Mr. Hamson, who has been collecting rainfall figures for 30 years, tells me that the month's rainfall was more than double the average for the previous twelve years.

In September, 6.57 in. fell in Uxbridge and 5.98 in. in Cowley, compared with an average of 3in. for the last twelve years and 1.83in. for the period 1939 to 1956.

During the weekend of September 14 and 15, 3.69in. was recorded in Cowley, more than the previous average for September.
